I was told by either Carolyn or Judy several years ago that it was the great singer, Mahalia Jackson, who was sitting behind Dr. King, who urged him to talk about his Dream. I am told that she was a great supporter of Dr. King and the Civil Rights Movement and always was available to them. The speech is a classic in American history. I remember standing on the steps of the Lincoln Memorial the last time I was in Washington and feeling the power of Dr. Martin Luther King's words and the emotional impact of those words. I got a bit emotional standing there. I think that speech of 60 years ago still has the power to bring us, as Americans, together despite our differences and to make us renew our commitment to working toward making a better country for everyone. Thank you to Mahalia Jackson and Martin Luther King for a great gift of a dream for our country, one for all of us to work toward.
