It was on the front page of THE NEW HAMPSHIRE SUNDAY NEWS yesterday. It is a story written by Shawne K. Wickham about two men from Amherst. The title is *WITH WAR RAGING IN THE HOLY LAND, THESE NH FRIENDS PRAY FOR PEACE*. It is about two local men who have been friends for more than 20 years. Mohammed Ewless, who owns a Middle Eastern restaurant and Paul

Moverman, who attends a synagogue in Nashua, are two friends who resolve not to let the current war in the Middle East disrupt their long friendship.

Their long friendship began when Moverman came to Ewliss' restaurant and he and his wife ordered roast beef sandwiches without the bread. It was during Passover when observant Jews can only eat unleavened bread. Ewliss came out and apologized for not having unleavened bread on hand. Their friendship grew from that first day, and over 20 plus years they have eaten together, traveled together and been friends. They both share the sadness that has come over the tragic situation in what is the Holy Land for both of their religious faiths, as well as our Christian faith. I share a small portion of the article as a key to avoiding the hatred between Israel and Hamas and really a key to trying to avoid and/or resolving conflicts between human beings:

Both like traveling and eating. "We've gone down to New York, to Jewish delis and to Queen's hookah bars," Moverman said. The two friends haven't talked much about the war in the Holy Land. But Moverman said, "Both of us feel the same way. People need to recognize and respect each other as people, and communicate.. The bottom line is thousands of people are dying because people won't just talk to each other.

We need to learn from this friendship. By talking as opposed to shooting and bombing we citizens of the world can work towards solving problems together and learning to laugh together, to share our burdens together and to work together to make life better for all of the inhab

itants of this tiny planet. Thanks to Shawne for a great article and to these two neighbors for giving us a model friendship which is a beacon of hope.
