Yesterday, I found a Meet the Press Interview with Amanda Gorman on Feb. 9. She is the young woman who delivered her poem, THE HILL WE CLIMB at President Biden's inauguration in January of 2021. At a time when thousands of government workers are losing their jobs, and immigrants are afraid of being picked up in the middle of the night, it brought me hope. She completed the poem on Jan. 6, 2021 after watching the invasion of the Capital building. The interview was done by Kristen Welker and is wonderful. I will just share a few lines with you and encourage you to read the whole poem. She is an amazing young black woman who dreams of running for President. She, like Joe Biden, has also overcome a speech impediment. Here is a small part of her poem:

We, the successors of a country and a time where a skinny black girl descended from slaves and raised by a single mother can dream of becoming President only to find herself reciting for one. And, yes, we are far from polished, far from pristine, but that doesn't mean we are striving to form a union that is perfect, we are striving to forge a union with purpose, to compose a country committed to all cultures, colors, characters and conditions of man. So we lift our gazes not to what stands between us, but what stands before us.. We close the divide because we know to put our future first, we must first put our differences aside. We lay down our arms so we can reach out our arms to one another, we seek harm to none and harmony for all. Let the globe, if nothing else, say this is true: that even as we grieved, we grew, even as we hurt, we hoped, that even as we tired, we tried, that we'll forever be tied together victorious, not because we will never again know defeat but because we will never again sow division.

Words of hope from a most inspiring Youth Poet Laureate. Interesting note....there have been efforts in Florida to ban her poems in school libraries.
